# Setting lives to music





hey sing about too many divorces, not enough lovin'; too many heartaches and beer-swillin' men; too many babies and pregnant again. They sing of hard times and good times. coal-minin' and crop-sharin', moonshine and sunshine, Mama who died and Daddy who drank, God and America, depressions and dreams. Their songs tell of their dirt-poor early lives. Growing up with hordes of brothers and sisters in hillbilly log cabins, scraping up a few pennies to buy batteries to listen to Nashville's Grand Ol' Opry radio show every Saturday night.

The legends, mixed one with another, have entered American folklore. There have been husbands and lovers, death and divorce, pills and pressures, trouble with kids, problems with men who booze, dramatic on-stage breakdowns and back-stage collapses. and all the time an unwritten Country rule that the show, with all its frills and flounces and wigs and glitter, must go on.

Tammy Wynette (played by Annette O'Toole in Channel Four's film autobiography Stand By Your Man), the 'first lady of Country music', has had the most tangled, haunted past of them all. Listen to her songs and you're listening to her life story. She sings about D.I.V.O.R.C.E. and, having suffered through four of them, she knows what she's writing about. She sings Stand By Your Man, even though some of the men she stood by were the boozers and no-hopers she writes about.

Now, at 43, a mother, stepmother and grandmother, she says she has finally found a man who will stand by her. It's taken 26 years. since her first marriage at 17, when she wed a wild drinkin' local boy to escape from the drudgery of working on her grandparents' cotton farm in Mississippi.

Tammy and that first husband lived in a log cabin with no plumbing. She had two babies in two years and was pregnant again when the marriage started crumbling. When she left town, continued overpage

# Where Bo Derek hardly causes a stir

he long drive through California horse country to John and Bo Derek's multi-million dollar, mountain-top ranch is a spectacular one. And the scene that greets you as you pass through the electric gates and wind your way up is breathtaking – green rolling hills, blue sky, priceless mares and stallions, exquisite Spanish-style house (even the stables have stained glass windows). Bo bare-faced and bra-less, John wild-haired and suntanned. You feel like you've stumbled on to one of their film sets.

As always in John Derek's quest for perfection, the house is being improved. In everybody else's eyes it's already a 10-plus.

John is overseeing the workmen, a handsome macho bunch of tobacco-chewing locals, none of whom seems particularly overwhelmed as one of the world's most famous beauties – 10, the film that made her famous, is on ITV this week – bounces around in her pink tracksuit, discussing drains and checking on the price of potted geraniums.

Up here the novelty of who Bo Derek is starts wearing off after a while with all these guys.' Bo says later as we sit in the Mexican-tiled kitchen. 'Well, almost. There's always a little bit of reaction but the shock of it goes. At first they can't look at you. It's so funny. They'd rather just go by and not have to talk to you. But now they're all relaxed.'

The ranch, with its 47 acres and stable of

Tohn wasn't sure I'd take to this kind of life.' says Bo Derek about her Spanish-style ranch in California, designed by husband John. It's all a far cry from Bo the sex symbol, as she rides her stallion, Morro, plays with her dogs and shares an intimate moment with John. Andalusians and Arabs, is a hilltop heaven

Andalusians and Arabs, is a hilltop heaven to Bo. The approach road, Monte Cielo, means 'mountain to heaven' and Bo drives down it to civilisation 'only when I really, really have to. Sometimes it has been months before I've left here.'

While not exactly just the folks who live on the hill, the Dereks have been fully accepted by the local horse-breeders and cattle ranchers. Bo says she can live 'as close to being a normal person' here. She goes on cattle round-ups with the cowboys, helps with branding, drives down to the feed store, the grocer's and the hardware store in her pick-up truck and hardly causes

a stir. Although now, at 28, she admits for the first time that she has to make a 'conscious effort' to put on make-up and look a little like the Bo people expect to see.

'It's an inconvenience; I'd prefer not to wear mascara or anything,' she says. 'But I think it's only fair to look as attractive as you can for your mate and the people around you. And when you're supposed to be Bo Derek, I think you have an obligation to look sort of what you're supposed to look like.'

John - wonderfully controversial and



continued from page 5 to find fame and fortune, her ex-husband drove by and shouted: 'So you're going to Nashville to be a hillbilly singer. Dream on.

She didn't see him again until 10 years later when she was signing autographs. He sheepishly handed her a picture to sign. 'I couldn't resist it – I wrote, "Dream on, baby – love Tammy."


She succeeded in her dream, she says, because 'I was headstrong, I was stubborn, I wouldn't take no for an answer.'

Within a year she had a recording contract, achieved her first hit and remarried. When that partnership failed, she married Country great George Jones, the man she's most famous for standing by. He had an infamous drinking problem but she thought she could change him. They had a daughter, they became Mr and Mrs Country Music, but the drinking went on and they divorced in 1975.

Next came a string of affairs, and a two-month marriage – 'a terrible mistake' – to businessman Michael Tomlin. Then the worst time: ill health, drug dependency and 13 operations for ulcers and stomach problems. There was also an apparent campaign of terror against her during which she was mysteriously abducted at gunpoint, beaten up, her home raided, fires started and phones tapped.

Seven years ago she married an old friend, George Richey. He and his wife had helped her over that terrible time, and no doubt the first Mrs Richey is now writing anguished songs of her

untamed – roams around with uncombed hair, listening to Bo and letting her have her say before stepping in. This is now obviously a much more equal partnership than it's ever been. Gone are the days when you could hardly get a peep out of Bo, when she would sit at John's feet unable to get a word in edgeways as he discussed her future for her.

'Well, it's been 11 years now,' says Bo.
'We know each other so well. In the
beginning I was so young. I'd been living a
quiet life with a very opinionated man and,
although we had travelled, it wasn't exactly
enlightening – we spent a year and a half

going around the world, living out of John's van. Then, when 10 happened and everyone started wanting my opinions, I'd go blank and would turn to John. It's taken a long time for me to understand what I feel about things.'

She has gone through a baptism of fire since 10 (1979) when, overnight, she became a superstar sex symbol. She made one more film without John – A Change of Seasons (1980) – hated working without him and declared she never would again.

Together they made Tarzan the Ape Man (1981), which was savaged by the critics but which grossed at least 30 million

dollars and is still making money, and Bolero (1984), which had the same reception and is making a fortune, although the Dereks are stuck in yet another of their infamous legal fights.

'Right now we're being sued for about 800 million dollars,' says Bo. 'It's insane. You do have to laugh at it. This is such a dishonest business and we're very honest people – we won't even allow a lie to go down without screaming to everybody.'

Controversial or not, the Dereks have no shortage of moneymen wanting to invest in a film with them ('We're good box office,' says Bo proudly) and they plan to start another film this summer with Bo starring and producing and John directing.

It will be hard for Bo to wrench herself away from the ranch. 'People just love coming up here to get away from it all,' she says as we go out to feed the horses. 'They can't believe how happy we are. We even had a family Thanksgiving last year – 18 of us altogether. I don't think we will ever do it again but it was fun for once.'

Despite a sentimental Thanksgiving, Bo says she and the 58-year-old Derek have no plans to start a family of their own.

'Four or five years ago I was thinking about having a baby but I think it's something you do when it's absolutely right, and things aren't right with our lifestyle. It would be criminal – all the travelling when we're working, all our impulsiveness. I could lose all this tomorrow; risk everything and lose it. You can't take that sort of risk with a child.

'All this' – she points to the house just as the sun is setting – is more than I ever imagined. Yes, I could lose all this. I think it would be hard for people who really wanted something like this all their life, who had fought hard for recognition. But I never wanted it, never tried to get it. Somebody saw me at dinner and introduced me to Blake Edwards [the director of 10] and suddenly there was "Bo". I'm grateful but I could go back to living in a van if I had to.'

And somehow the way Bo Derek says it, jumping into the pick-up truck to drive down Monte Cielo to the store, almost makes you believe it.

own. Last year, Tammy conquered her dependency on pain pills. She has been reconciled with her 20-year-old daughter Tina, who ran away from home when she was 17 claiming she was neglected. She has swapped her two milliondollar estate for smaller homes in Nashville and Florida, has lost weight, and changed her hairstyle.

I look at life differently now because of Richey. These past seven years with him have been the most contented I've known since I was a little girl. I've accomplished what I've always dreamed of doin'. When you have a dream and it's fulfilled, what else can you ask for?'

In the world of Country music, Tammy's story is by no means unique.

Dolly Parton was brought up in the Smokey Mountains of Tennessee, one of 12 children in a family that was so poor their only entertainment was church-going and family sing-songs.

'We didn't have electricity,' says Dolly. 'We didn't have a toilet or bath. We only had the Bible to read and we used to play out lots of stories from it.'

By the age of 10 she was singing on local radio, and two years later had made it to the Grand Ol' Opry. She always knew she was going to be a star, and on the day she graduated from high school she moved to Nashville. It was on that same eventful day that she met the man who was to be her husband, Carl Dean, at a laundromat. They've been together ever since.

Today, at 39, Dolly is 300 million dollars richer, but drives round Beverly Hills in a pick-up truck 'to remind her of her roots'.

The story of Loretta Lynn is equally fascinating. Born a coalminer's daughter in a cabin in Butcher's Hollow. Kentucky, she was one of eight children, married at 13. a mother at 14. had four of her six children in the first four years and was a grandmother at 29. Her husband was - and is -Doolittle 'Mooney' Lynn, a one-time Kentucky moonshiner who listened to Loretta crooning to her children, bought her a guitar and drove her

80,000 miles round the country selling her record, *I'm a Honky Tonk Girl* 

Loretta is no longer a girl, but at 50 and one of America's best loved singers, she still wants to head out on the road. Perhaps she speaks for all the Country queens when she says: 'I don't want the dream to end, to be back in the black dust where everybody's Daddy died young. I think, sure I worked like heck, but don't a yardman or a washerwoman? I ain't worked no harder, and it's them I sing for.

### Take three convent girls

In Thursday's Channel Four film, 'Sacred Hearts' (1984), set in a convent school in the early Forties, the girls have to take baths wearing coarse blue ankle-length robes, and punishment is rife, even for minor misdemeanors.

Here, Alix Coleman talks to three stars about their experiences of convent school.



Mary O'Hara

WELL KNOWN as both singer and harpist, Mary, now 50, attended two convent schools in

Ireland. She went to a day school from the age of four to 12, then Sion Hill School where she boarded until 16 — the age at which she was pictured as games captain (inset).

When I was sent to Sion Hill,' she says, 'it was as though I'd been released. I lost a lot of inhibitions about speaking out. I kicked over the traces, principally in games. I was good at games and I felt I'd never been allowed to play them properly. Eventually, I became games captain. With all this relief and emancipation I turned quite unbiddable. I never observed the silences and at one point, when I was chatting away, they said that if I broke one more minor rule they wouldn't be responsible for me any longer. I sneaked out once with a couple of others for an ultrainnocent but illicit rendezvous with boys and when we were found out there was a tremendous furore.

There weren't a lot of religious services and there was no compulsion to attend them. There was an 8am mass but, if you asked for a sleep instead, you got your sleep.

'It wasn't until after I'd left, when I went back for singing lessons, that I formed relationships with the nuns. It was as if I was meeting them for the first time.'

RECENTLY seen on ITV in Auf Wiedersehen, Pet, Lysette went to a Montessori school,

which was also a day convent, at the age of four. Now 21, she remembers how she was sent at 10 to Stoodley Knowle Convent School, Torquay, as a boarder: 'I cried my eyes out before I went, but I did enjoy it a lot, and I cried again when I left.

'I'm an only child and my parents had split up, so the convent gave me a real sense of family. We were well taught. I went in bottom and came out with seven O-levels. It was very strict but I don't think in retrospect that's a bad thing. I'm grateful for what I learned. On my first night I walked down the dormitory in my vest and everyone said "Oooh!" And I didn't know what was wrong. In the past girls had been expelled for sunbathing, but, although it wasn't allowed, the punishment in my time wasn't so severe.'

In our inset picture, Lysette is a cheeky 14 and finding some comfort in the convent's regimen: 'Gosh, yes, there was a lot of religion. There was daily mass at 7.30am but we only had to go twice a week — as well as once on Sundays — and we could choose the time. I found as I got older that it was a great comfort, especially during O-levels. I was in the choir, too, and it gave me a great sense of peace.'

YOU MIGHT remember Kim's face as that of Sally Jupp in ITV's recent murder

mystery series Cover Her Face. The 24-yearold actress was a day girl at Notre Dame Convent School in Cobham, Surrey, from the age of 11 until she left at 17. Says Kim, pictured inset at 11: 'I'm not a Catholic, but they weren't heavy about it. I started off with mass every week and got it down to twice a term. It just happened to be the best school around. I got 10 O-levels and three A's.

'I don't know that anything much distinguished us from an ordinary school — we wore the usual navy blue uniform — except, perhaps, that one or two of the older nuns wore full-length habits.

'Games weren't compulsory at the school, however, and I was never in the netball team. In my early years I used to pretend that I wanted to go into the chapel at lunch break just to get out of the cold. But they soon cottoned on and I was stopped. Everyone was very nice, though, not strict.

'Å lot of the teachers weren't even Catholics, let alone nuns, but I'm sure the majority of the pupils were. My experiences were all good, and I've lots of happy memories about the time I spent there. And as I'd previously been to a boarding school, it was lovely to go home in the evenings.'





### ernard Bresslaw hesitated slightly before accepting the role of Duncan, the toughie in Channel Four's comedy series Mann's Best Friends.

The action centres around the occupants of a dilapidated old house which the owner insists on filling with assorted livestock. Aggressive, hard-drinking Duncan is constantly clashing with fellow resident Ordway (see picture), an officious, retired water-board official played by Fulton Mackay.

Scripted by Roy (Last of the Summer Wine) Clarke, it is, Bresslaw feels, 'a very literate comedy, extremely well-written. My character, Duncan, is quite lovable

really'.

So what made Bresslaw pause? Working with animals is a disaster as far as I'm concerned because I'm not very good with them. Neither my wife, Liz, nor I are pet people but, as the children were growing

up, we began to feel that perhaps we were depriving them. We called to see my brother just when his dog had a litter of pups and of course, it was all, "Dad, let's have one!"

'It took only four days for the novelty to wear off. I said, "Has the dog been fed?" Each insisted the other was supposed to do it. By this time, I had grown fond of the dog but, as I was often touring, keeping it was impractical. We found a marvellous home for him with friends and that was the first and last

encounter with animals in the house.

The Bresslaw home is a light, spacious, 17-year-old house on a Hertfordshire hillside, which they moved into when it was newly built. Liz Bresslaw, who met her husband when she was a dancer at the London Palladium, is beginning to think it might be nice to move again. 'I'd quite like an older house, something we could restore,' she says.

She admits this is not a very practical idea for, in spite of having a tall, strong husband and three strapping sons all living at home - James, 24, Mark, 21, and Jonathan, 17not one of them is a

lawyer, Mark works in a bank and Jonathan is studying for his A-levels.

Bresslaw is an erudite man, warm and charming. His bolt-hole is his study, a 'cosy' room where he likes to read. The trouble is that it's too cosy; the rest of the family gravitate towards it.

His parents were 'a little alarmed' when he became an actor, not a 'usual' thing in London's Stepney, especially for the son of a tailor's presser, although his mother was a devotee of the Hackney Empire and a flamboyant and extrovert

It is more than 30 years since a huge, saucer-eyed young actor stepped onto London's West End stage for the first time to play the juvenile lead in a pertlytitled drama called Wrestler's Honeymoon.

Bernard Bresslaw's debut certainly broke records. We opened on the Thursday — and closed on Saturday,' Bresslaw chuckles deeply. For a while, it held the record as the shortest run ever.' It was an inauspicious start to a career which has grown steadily over the years and diverted Bresslaw down most of the avenues of the entertainment world.

An acclaimed theatre actor, he has toured in many productions by Shakespeare, Chekhov and Shaw and is due to appear as Prospero in Philip Grout's production of The Tempest at the Ludlow Festival in June.

Bresslaw crossed into films for the best of British humour in countless Carry On capers. He also became one of the earliest stars created by television as the gormless Private Popeye in ITV's The Army Game.

'It was my size that got me that first theatre role, Bernard Bresslaw explains. 'I had to play a big Irish wrestler and the play was put on by Laurence Olivier. He said, "Your name might be difficult, people might spell it wrongly. Why not find something easier?" I didn't object, but I just never got around to it. If I had, I might be Bernard Redford by now!'

The outspoken flame-haired beauty, who shocked people in the Fifties with her determination to remain an unmarried mother, is now acknowledged as a world expert on Gainsborough. She is the person whom Sotheby's and Christie's call in when they need some information on the famous 18th-century artist. Adrienne has always

been an art lover. She says: 'As a child, I used to play truant in the Edinburgh National Gallery.'

Her interest in Thomas Gainsborough began seven years ago while she was appearing in a play at the Alexandra Theatre, Birmingham. She spotted a dingy painting of the actor David Garrick on the wall of the bar, and was certain that it was by Gainsborough.

The theatre let her clean and restore the painting — she is pictured with it above — after which she became even more

convinced that she was right. Art experts laughed at the idea, but Adrienne insisted.

For the next seven years, Adrienne turned art detective, chasing up clues to the painting's origins and ruining her eyesight poring over 18th-century ledgers in the vaults of merchant banks.

Finally, her determination paid off. She found a recorded payment dated 1742 to the 16-year-old Gainsborough which could well have been for the portrait — said to be worth as much as £800,000 at auction. Other evidence proved that Gainsborough started to paint very young and led to the discovery of a self-portrait painted at the age of 10.



### Bright ideas for busy people

ACTRESS Paula Wilcox, who plays Mrs Bright of Channel Four's The Bright Side, is very fond of fresh fruit and vegetables. She is delighted with the vast choice available from all over the world in just about every supermarket.

Tve just come back from a trip to the north of England, and the pick of exotic fruits was quite unbelievable. I bought mangos, papaws and lychees and four different sorts of grape. I'm a bit of a grape freak and love them all, from tiny seedless green to big black juicy ones.

'I enjoy food and cooking and, if I'm giving a dinner party, I often make really wicked trifle, oozing with booze and cream!


1 thsp fresh chopped parsley

Sauté onion and garlic in oil until soft. Add red pepper and stir in rice until well coated. Add vegetable or chicken stock and bay-leaf. Bring to the boil then turn down to simmer until the liquid is absorbed and rice is tender. (Brown rice takes longer than white to cook, and you may need to top







continued from page 19 much she got for hers as it was sold by a friend when she went to work in America for a year. It certainly wasn't very much...

'Everything is so nicely made,' she exclaimed. examining the Cowley's familiar nickel-plated radiator shell and the substantial, no-nonsense controls.

A pre-war Austin 10 tourer replaced the Cowley when Prunella returned from America. She bought it from a farmer for £30.

These enjoyable if slightly eccentric old cars fit perfectly with Prunella's view of motoring. 'I hate the idea of cars as status symbols; they're simply a convenient way of getting from A to B.

Prunella and her husband, actor Timothy West, have two cars, a Renault 20 and a Volkswagen Golf. 'The Golf is excellent — lovely light steering. The Renault is fast and comfortable though mechanically it's a disaster — it's had eight breakdowns in two years.'

Time doesn't allow Prunella to fix the Renault's many ills herself, though if she had to she probably could. 'When I had the Austin I enjoyed mechanics, probably because I had a boyfriend who was an engineer. He made me de-coke the engine, change plugs, tyres and do all sorts of maintenance.'

'Image' isn't important to Prunella, but function is, so the Renault gets high marks for its hatchback versatility, its comfort and its power-steering. But, given its history of breakdowns, does she have a dream car? 'A Renault 20 that works...

When she comes to replace it - and the battery was flat again the other day - she would like to buy British. But among the Austin Rover offerings there doesn't seem to be quite the right car - the Rover is a bit too big, the Maestro too small, and the Montego doesn't have a hatchback. Prunella is beginning to wonder if an estate car might best meet her needs.



historians think not. It depends on what is meant by a 'motor car' — there were mechanically-propelled road vehicles before 1885, such as steam carriages. Then there were traction engines for agriculture and haulage.

What we now recognise as a car grew out of experiments with early internal combustion engines — the same, in principle, as those used today. Several pioneer engineers fitted their crude power units into carts and carriages to investigate the possibilities of a 'horseless'

carriage'.
One such
was Gottlieb
Daimler who first
fitted his engine to a
sort of wooden-framed
bicycle with little
'stabiliser' wheels, like a
child's first two-wheeler. So

'stabiliser' wheels, like a child's first two-wheeler. So Daimler's first vehicle from 1885 was really a motor bike!

Not far away from Daimler's Stuttgart workshop, in Mannheim, Karl Benz was building his first road-runner using a similar four-stroke engine to Daimler's. He patented a motor car in January 1886.

The first Benz wasn't a car in today's sense either, for it had only three wheels. It was some years before Benz devised proper steering for a four-wheeled car, but, by 1886, Daimler had moved from two wheels to four by installing his engine in what had been a horse-drawn carriage.

So that's why the Germans propose to celebrate the car's 100th birthday in 1986 rather than this year.

The French, however, congratulated themselves

### AA Open Road

last year, after discovering a patent for a gas engine built by Edouard Delamare-Deboutteville, dated 1884.

Like Daimler, the
Frenchman did not set out
to make a car; he was
looking for applications for
his engine. So Benz, who
started to sell his 'patent'
three-wheeler almost
immediately, can be seen
as the father of motoring.

Britain really had no part in the emergence of these early vehicles. Opposition to steam carriages and traction engines had led to the Locomotives on Highways Act which, until 1878, required a man with a red flag to walk in front of the vehicle. Then they dropped the flag rule but the attendant was still needed. This 'Red Flag Act' was not repealed until 1896 an event commemorated to this day by the November London to Brighton veteran car run. Before then, there were no more than a few imported automobiles in this country. But the first all-British cars, from Frederick Lanchester, were also being developed at this time.

Perhaps, because we

have no claim to have produced the first car, Britain's motoring institutions have adopted 1985 as the centenary year. Over the coming Bank Holiday weekend — 25, 26 and 27 May - Silverstone motor racing circuit will host the Motor 100 festival of motoring, claimed to be the greatest collection of motor vehicles ever assembled'. On 5 June, Prince Charles will open the centenary project of the National Motor Museum at Beaulieu, Hampshire. This exhibition. called Wheels, depicts motoring history in 22 scenes through which visitors will ride in swivelling 'pods'.

When you look at the veteran cars exhibited at these events, spare a thought for what it was like to travel by car at the turn of the century.

The first cars were open, of course, with nothing like a windscreen and only the skimpiest mudguards. So the 'automobilist' and his passengers had to dress up in heavy coats and windproof headgear. The early 'hot tube' ignition had

to be warmed up by lighting a burner well before setting out; then, with the carburettor 'flooded', the starting handle had to be cranked.

Then it was time to set off. Early cars had all kinds of weird transmissions but, by 1900, the sliding-pinion gearbox was in fairly general use. That is basically the same as the gearbox in a modern car.

Brakes — on the back wheels only, and operated by pedal or hand lever weren't up to much.

The pioneer motorists, or at least their chauffeurs, needed to be mechanics as well. Engines needed frequent attention, clutches had to be carefully tended, chains cleaned and greased. Punctures were a way of motoring life, partly because the roads were poor and the early pneumatic tyres weak, but mostly because there were so many horse-shoe nails strewn around.

Early motoring wasn't easy but, with fewer restrictions — no driving test, no parking problems, cheap petrol — it was certainly more fun!

Austin Rover's Eastern promise

WHILE Austin Rover moves closer to its Japanese associate, Honda — their joint 'executive' car, code-named XX, will go on sale next year — in one respect the British car giant has struck a blow for independence. The Rover 216, introduced a few weeks ago, is more than 80 per cent British. . though it started out as a Honda.

The Rover 200 series was introduced last year as a replacement for the Triumph Acclaim. That was the first fruit of the links between BL and Honda and was little more than a Honda Ballade saloon put together in a British factory. The Rover 213, based on the new Honda Civic, followed the trend. Its engine and most other mechanical parts were supplied from Japan.

The 216, however, has much more British content because, although it has the same Honda-derived bodyshell, it uses the 1.6 litre 'S' series engine from the Austin Maestro and Montego. The Austin Rover engineers have also taken the opportunity to improve the car's suspension, and the revised arrangements are applied to both the 213 and 216.

Automatic transmission becomes available on these well-furnished small saloons for the first time. That for the 213S and SE is a Honda three-speed auto while the 216 Vanden Plas EFi can be specified with the German ZF four-speed transmission designed for optimum fuel economy.

All the manual-gearbox Rover 200s and the Maestro and Montego two-litre models use Honda five-speed transmissions, a version of which is now to be made in Britain under licence — ready for the XX.

### **Bodies with** bounce

REMEMBER those mail vans and newspaper delivery vehicles with rubber mudguards? The new Reliant Scimitar SS1, below, achieves much the same protection from light knocks with its flexible body panels made from RRIM (Reinforced Reaction Injection Moulding). 

ew mysterious numbers are creeping into motoring jargon as it enters its second century. Time was when everyone could understand claims made by car manufacturers in their advertisements or in the results of motoring magazine tests: mph. mpg. 0-60 acceleration times. But, today, there is a new factor — Cd or drag coefficient. The numbers are in decimals and the differences between them are measured in hundreths.

The Cd is a yardstick of how efficiently a car cuts through the air — how 'slippery' it is. Think about trying to walk into a galeforce wind and you have some idea of what a car is up against at speed.

The smoother the shape,

the smaller the frontal area the car presents to the air, the less drag it will create and the more easily it can slice through it. Which means that for a given amount of power from the engine, the car can go faster or use less fuel, or both.

Drag is measured in a wind-tunnel where, instead of the car speeding through the air, it stands still and an

Open Road is written by Ray Hutton, with additional research by Charmian Evans. artificial wind is blown at it. The loads on the car are measured to calculate the Cd. Coloured smoke can show car designers how the air moves round the body.

Though these aerodynamic effects do not count for much at low speeds — in town traffic, for example — they increase sharply, so that at 60mph air resistance is four times greater than at 30mph.

So, a low Cd is worth having. The average modern car has a Cd of about 0.40. The best achieved by one of those ultra-low streamlined prototypes is 0.15. Among production saloons the Audi 100 set a new standard in 1982 of 0.30 and proudly wears the number on its rear windows. Since then, the Renault 25TS has done better at 0.28, while the latest Vauxhall Astra GTE claims 0.30, which is particularly impressive as low drag is easier to arrange on a long car such as the Audi, than a smaller one, such as the Astra.

### ot to be forgotten among all the brouhaha of the centenary of

the car is the fact that this year is also the 50th anniversary of the driving test. And this year, as often in the past, there is a solid lobby pushing for a tougher test.

The argument is that driving conditions are much more difficult today. After all, there are 10 times as many cars on the road as there were in 1935. Other countries have longer tests and require written examinations as well as an on-the-road trial with an examiner.

In this country, anyone who has a valid, full driving licence, can teach someone else to drive a car. There has been a call - notably from the Driving Instructors' Association — for every learner to have professional driving tuition. Apart from giving them more business, this would,

they say, improve driving standards. And the instructors also want trainee instructors to be required to have a minimum of 40 hours' training.

The instructors are not alone in asking for a longer test with more emphasis on the kind of manoeuvre that a motorist has to undertake every day - such as reversing into a parking space.

In practice, this would be difficult to arrange. Tests take place on ordinary public roads and there are no special areas at most centres where examiners could test an applicant's parking skill. Certainly, they couldn't

use a gap between any two parked vehicles around the test route!

Over recent years there have been several suggestions for improving the eyesight test. A proper optician's sight test is advocated instead of please read that number plate' (approximately 67ft away).

The intention of all these extensions and improvements to the driving test is, of course, to

make Britain's roads safer. But there isn't much evidence to show that they are needed. The driving test procedure may be much the same as it was in 1935 but, because it takes place on public roads which are much more crowded and complicated than they were 50 years ago, it has automatically become tougher.

The Automobile Association has studied the driving test and accident statistics. It points out that road-accident casualties, serious as they are, have actually gone down in recent years and are not dramatically higher than in 1935. Our statistics are also more favourable than those of several other European countries where driving tests are more elaborate.

The AA concludes that there is no evidence which supports a longer, tougher, test; nor evidence that creating a monopoly of "professional" driving instruction is necessary

It would be in favour of giving learners some experience on motorways (L-drivers are banned from motorways at present), but points out that it would be difficult to arrange a consistent test at the 400 testing centres, some of which are nowhere near such highspeed roads.

Jim Carr, the AA's public policies manager says: When more than 50 per cent of candidates fail the present relatively simple test, where is the justification for an even tougher one?' Experience. he says, is the most important factor in accident avoidance. Passing the test is only the first stage.

I hope I would be able to pass today, though I'd probably have to swot up on braking distances now that they're in metres. And all of us get into bad habits over the years. My son Sam used to criticise us when he was learning. So I think professional help is best.'

### Nigel Hawthorne

'Driving is a pleasure that has come to me relatively late in life. I took to the road only four years ago and passed my test in Barnet, north London. The night before I was due to take it, I read in the paper about new markings on the motorway. To memorise them I got out my watercolours and did a sketch. Good thing, too, because the question did come up and I passed first time. The build-up makes one quite nervous bad as a first night.'

### Geraldine McEwan

'I went for my test 23 years ago, having been warned about a tyrannical female driving tester. As I got to the centre, I realised I was going to have this woman. 'I can't really remember whether I've taken a driving test or not. Not that I'm that old, but back in New Zealand, where I was born, it was a pretty simple affair and you can take your test there when you are 15. I can recall borrowing my brother's big American Ford — provided you could get the car round a corner, you would be almost guaranteed a pass.



### Bloodline

In the novel on which this film is based, the leading lady was 23: in the film she becomes 35 and Audrey Hepburn was 50 when she played the part - looking good, if not 35, in some stunning designer outfits. Bloodline (1979) was Hepburn's second comeback film in 10 years. She had previously starred in Robin and Marian (1976), not a huge boxoffice success, casting Hepburn as the ageing Maid Marian. She is much more at home in Bloodline - on ITV - playing Elizabeth Roffe, heiress to a giant pharmaceutical firm and 'tall, elegant, beautiful'. ### FRIDAY 10 MAY The Great Rock 'n' Roll Swindle

A semi-surrealistic survey of the rise and fall of the pop group The Sex Pistols and the opportunism involved in its manipulation in the media. The whole enterprise leaves a nasty taste, and is certainly an eye-opener into a world whose sins are all too often glossed over.

### Asylum

Compilation horror films abounded in the British cinema of the Sixties and Seventies, but this is about the best — and has suitably sombre performances by Robert Powell and Patrick Magee at its centre. 1972

### SATURDAY Ruggles of Red Gap

4- 1.55pm-3.40pm Heartwarming comedy about an English butler taken to Red Gap in America where he becomes a celebrity. Charles Laughton, in very spritely form, never puts a foot wrong as the manservant who becomes his own master, and shares the film's best sequence with Charlie Ruggles and James Burke when the three go out on a boozy binge.

### **Judge Priest**

4- 3.40pm-5.05pm Unseen for many years, this folksy piece of Americana is one of the few films remade by its original director, in this case John Ford, who reshot the story nearly 20 years later as The Sun Shines Bright. Coincidentally, the two leading actors in these films, Will Rogers in Judge Priest and Charles Winninger in the remake, doubled up on another famous role — the father in the 1933 and 1945 versions of State Fair. Rogers dominates this movie, saturating the old judge in his own unique personality.

### '10'

10.00pm-12.15am A wishfulfilment sex frolic which made hot box-office properties out of Dudley Moore and Bo Derek. The plot is the kind of thing director Blake Edwards might have done, a little less outspokenly, perhaps, with his favourite star Peter Sellers some years before. But here it's cuddly Dudley as the fortyish bachelor who finds his perfect girl (the '10' of the title) only to discover in the end that looks can be all too deceptive. Edwards finds a few funny situations in all this, mostly in his familiar Clouseau vein, such as the doddery old maidservant who tries to serve drinks to a 1935 | chimney.

### Lancer Spy

4 5.30pm-7.00pm This exciting melodrama was Russian actor Gregory Ratoff's first try at directing a Hollywood film and a first-class job he made of it. The 'unsuitable job' is of course, detection, at least in this context; Petit's straightforward treatment of the whodunit that results rather vitiates the script and settings to create a film divided against itself. But the plot carries its own fascination and there are strong performances from Pippa Guard (as the detective) and Billie Whitelaw. 1981

### The Black Torment

ITV 12midnight-1.30am A nicely nightmarish horror-thriller, set in the 18th century, on a split personality theme. Director Robert Hartford-Davis gives considerable evidence of having been influenced by The Innocents Tom Jones, The Spectre and others, and achieves one shivery scene that shows real flair, as a ghost in white bridal gown, riding a black horse through grey woods, thunders after the hero with an echoing cry of 'Murderer!' Ann Lynn is outstanding.

# rom the upstairs of his house in Hertfordshire, Nigel Hawthorne can look out on three counties. A ripe old dwelling with a vast cellar built over six wells and sturdy brickwork which has stood for some four centuries, it is a house surrounded by enough land to maintain the privacy which Hawthorne enjoys and needs.

Here he lives with Bertie and Parsley, two extremely well-behaved cats, and Oscar, a bouncy sort of collie dog. Acting is a job Hawthorne loves, as people often love a job they do supremely well. But away from the job he gardens, he photographs, he worries about conservation. He belongs to the World Wildlife Fund and Friends of the Earth, and he believes in attracting wildlife to his garden.

From this base he sets out to make his marvellous television programmes. He is at work on the second series of Channel Four's Mapp & Lucia and later this year he starts another series of Yes, Minister.

Hawthorne has not always managed to live solitarily, although he has always wanted to. At one time he was surrounded by predatory neighbours in a built-up area near London. Where he is now they may suspect your business but they've no way of finding out for sure'.

A lot of the time he wears wigs, or colours his crisp, greying hair for parts. Or grows and colours a beard or a moustache, only to shave everything off again. So he is seldom identified, which is fine by him. Once, in a supermarket, an excitable female fan hit him hard on the arm and said: 'It is, isn't it?' When he nervously replied that, yes, it was, she slapped the small boy with her and roared: 'I told you.' For the retiring Hawthorne it's a dismaying story which about sums up the joys of being recognised.

In fact, the only kind of recognition to suit Nigel Hawthorne is the recognition that he is a very good actor. And that was a long while coming. The son of an English doctor, he was brought up in South Africa and came here at the age of 21 with

£12 in his pocket and although he was born in this country—the strange and alienating feeling of being neither South African nor English. 'It's ironic. These days I seem to play nothing but the most Establishment Englishmen.'

The one person he knew was Shaun Sutton, former head of BBC TV Drama. 'He helped me to get my first job, but from there on it was up to me, and sometimes it was very tough, as it is for us all. It was a struggle until I

The end of 1979 and the beginning of 1980 were stellar months for Hawthorne. After taking viewers by storm with his manic taxi-driver instructor in The Knowledge, he brought down the house with his weasel Sir Humphrey Appleby in Yes, Minister. He is currently doing this again as genteel Georgie Pillson in Mapp & Lucia.

In 1980 he won the Broadcasting Press Guild award for top television actor. He looks back on the stages of his professional life with a lucid irony that seldom quits him. In his dry, silky voice, flicking glances from those bright, dark eyes, he observed that for nearly 20 years he beat in vain on the doors of the Royal Shakespeare Company. Last year he was offered a huge season at Stratford — Malvolio, Cardinal Wolsey, the lot. 'I told them they'd left it too late. I don't now want to spend two years having my life consumed by the RSC.

He feels that he has rather gone off the stage, anyhow. I just find it interesting to look for ways of being convincing. I'm often seen as a strongly obsessive character. It's something I suggest, although I'm not obsessive.

'If I didn't want the parts, I wouldn't take them. I'd always thought that in this job you need to get into a position where you choose your own work, and I'm like that now. But it's taken a long time to get there.'

He does not resent the wait. 'It was my apprenticeship. I knew, because I have this funny moon face, that I wasn't going to be an overnight sensation. A director once told me, "Start worrying. Get some lines on your face."

They came. They're there.'


#### Last words
